

MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

The last few years have been marked by unprecedented change. We've almost become immune to what "unprecedented" means and what rapid change means for all of us — for our community, for our team, for our neighbours, and for us as whole persons, created in the image of God, with physical, emotional, and spiritual needs.

In the aftermath of the pandemic, our community is seeing the collision of three crises: a worsening opioid overdose crisis, an accelerating housing crisis, and a deepening food affordability crisis. More folks are being pushed onto the streets by unjust circumstances and forces that are out of their control. Our friends, both housed and unhoused, are telling us it's getting harder to make life work.

This year we celebrated our 30th anniversary, and we found ourselves returning to our roots in many ways: inperson church services started back up, arts drop-in resumed, and we welcomed our friends back indoors to eat a meal together for the first time since March 2020. While not quite back to "normal," it has felt like a blessing to return to the communal practices that have sustained us for so long: worshiping together, breaking bread together, creating together.

Our 30th anniversary also marked some big changes. Alan Beattie, our Executive Director of 10 years and a member of the leadership team for over 20 years, felt God calling him away from the staff team and into a period of reflection. We are grateful for his steady shepherding and love for our community. After a period of interim leadership, to whom we also owe a debt of gratitude, Simon was appointed.

The Board also recognized the need for a new leadership structure and appointed Tanja Futter and Rachel Tulloch as joint Pastoral Directors to provide the staff with greater support and pastoral care, along with a sharper ministry vision.

In addition, in late 2022, the Board and the staff embarked on a multi-phase journey to lean further into conversations about racial justice in order to ensure we create an equitable community, addressing systemic barriers to diversity.

Through all of this, God has remained faithful. Our donors, supporters, staff members, and community members have remained steadfast. We are immensely grateful for the ongoing commitment to the simple vision that has guided us for the last 30 years.


